Reading United players paid a



previous visit to the clinic on July 2, and children in the academy have been given tickets to the team's home games, played at Exeter's Don Thomas Stadium. "It was a great opportunity to partner with Reading United," Klahr said. "Especially when the kids see these role models. They're all college students. They're coming from foreign countries, and they represent a lot of the diversity we see with the kids in our program. So, I think it's a win-win for all of us. "Many people, Camille Stock said, don't realize the high level of soccer and talent right here in Berks. "It's great just to give these kids an opportunity to see - this is what happens if you keep playing," said Stock, the recreation commission's chief development officer.
